# **5 Things to Do on a Sunny Day**


#### For babies:

1. Take a tour of the park. Holding baby in your arms, show him all the cool things in your park or yard: Here's the slide—want to touch? Here's the garbage can, it's stinky! This is a rose bush, let's have a smell! Give him the chance to explore what's safe to touch—like shaking a branch or grabbing the swing.

2. Try tummy time on the grass. Lay a towel or blanket on the grass outside and then place baby on her belly. Lie down facing her, if you'd like. Read a board book or try a finger-play offsite link as you experience the world from a new perspective.

#### For toddlers:

3. Paint a shower curtain. Big, messy art projects are more fun outside when it's warm and a hose is within easy reach for clean-up. You'll need: an inexpensive shower curtain or liner (or old newspapers), washable paints, and bathing suits or old clothes for the painters. (Paintbrushes are optional. Kids can also paint with hands and feet.) Spread the shower curtain or newspapers on the ground and start painting.



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4. Wash up! Gather up toy cars and trucks, washable dolls, child-safe plates/cups, and more. Fill a plastic container part way with water. If you want bubbles, add dish soap or shaving cream. Offer your child sponges, brushes, or dish rags to use as cleaning tools. (Supervise all water activities carefully and pour water out when your child is done playing.)

#### For babies and toddlers:

5. Have a picnic. Lay a blanket or towel on the ground outside and enjoy a meal or snack under a bright blue sky. Bring a few books to share, sing some songs. Lay on your back to look at the clouds or lay on your bellies to look at each other.

Children grow, develop, and learn throughout their lives. Alabama's Early Learning Guidelines are presented as a guide of building blocks that are important to support early care and to educate providers in preparing each child for future success in school and life. This basic- level, 18-hour course is broken down into 9, two-hour sessions. After completing the 18-hour curse, you will receive an Alabama Early Learning Guidelines Credential from The Department of Human Resources. You must attend Session 1: Orientation before taking any other session.

# **5 Steps to Prepare Your Child Care Center for Re-Opening After COVID-19**

You may be eager to get your child care center up and running, but there are some important steps to think through first including your finances, updating health and safety procedures, reassuring families their children will be protected and training your staff on new processes. This checklist can help ensure you've taken the necessary steps.

### **Strategically Prioritize**

Carefully think through all the steps required to reopen your child center, define priorities and focus on what's most important. Doing this will give you clarity and peace of mind.

- Stay in touch with local regulatory agencies. They have the best, most up-to-date information on what you'll need to do when you reopen.
- Communicate regularly with your families and staff about your reopening plans.

### **Carefully Assess Finances**

Forecast enrollment rates, including planning for new regulations that limit the number of children per room. If families slowly re-enroll their children, assess the impact to your finances. Conversely, how would you handle an overwhelming number of new enrollment requests?

- Estimate expenses including the number of employees you'll need and new supplies to purchase such as masks, PPE and disinfectants.
- If you applied for assistance and haven't received funding yet, stay in constant contact with your lender. Be persistent and don't give up until you get a hard "no".

# **Address Parents' Fears**

Clearly describe to parents the new procedures you're implementing to protect their children. Your reassurance that you're committed to keeping their children safe will impact their willingness to reenroll.

- Explain new procedures such as screening staff and children regularly for symptoms and requiring curb-side/drop-off. Describe how your staff will enforce proper social distancing, wear PPE and disinfect surfaces frequently.
- Reach out frequently to keep parents updated on your reopening timeline and to provide reassurances that you care about them and their children.

### **Prepare Your Staff**

Train staff on procedures and make sure they're comfortable with them.

- Poll your staff to determine which employees will return. Do any have pre-existing health conditions or young children at home that make it difficult to work? Are there other ways they can support your childcare center in the meantime such as doing office tasks?
- Regularly ask how they are doing and update them on your reopening plans.

## **Stay Positive and Focused on New Opportunities**

Be positive and confident in all your communications - parents and staff will find it reassuring.

Look for new business opportunities. For example, some of your competitors may not re-open. Can you form partnerships with them to welcome their students to your centers?

Are there new services you can provide such as extended care hours? .

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# TRUCE Family Play Plans for Summer

Summertime is the perfect time for families to get outside and play. Splashing in water on a hot day. Digging in cool, slippery mud. Chalking up a sidewalk or driveway with hopscotch games or original drawings. Planting a simple garden. What child can resist such fun activities, especially when joined by siblings, parents, or even grandparents, and sometimes friends too?

Children need to learn again how to become engaged in simple games and outdoor play. But, sadly, nowadays many families seem less and less to be playing together. Busy schedules leave little time for play and little time to be together as a family. In addition, screen-based entertainment is a constant distraction. Children need to learn again how

 they get from screen activities. However, today's parents may not have had opportunities
 to play when they were growing up so may not be familiar with simple games and
 pastimes to introduce to their own children.

For these reasons, TRUCE (Teachers Resisting Unhealthy Children's Entertainment), created a set of Family Play Plans to give parents some simple ideas for seasonal family activities. All the suggested activities use inexpensive or free materials that are readily available such as sand, water, cardboard, bubbles, or string. Unlike specialized toys, openended materials like these offer endless opportunities for rich, creative, and on-going play. The ideas can be expanded and developed depending on family member's abilities

and interests.

The TRUCE Family Play Plans are fun and engaging for children, but also provide opportunities for them to learn skills such as cooperation, turn taking, and problem-solving. Parents or caregivers can add to the value of the play by getting involved, as needed, and talking about what children are doing. Most of all, the fun of playing together as a family will create powerful and lasting memories. So put away those screens and get playing! Happy summer!

Water is a simple, everyday material which can be turned into endless hours of creative family play, especially during the hot days of summer. For example, children love "painting" with water. Fill a small bucket with water and provide paint brushes or rollers. The water darkens the surface temporarily and makes it look like a fresh coat of paint. A box or two of chalk can provide hours of family fun. Children can experiment with chalk pieces of different sizes—fat and thin, long and short. Draw roads on the sidewalk for toy cars and trucks. Create a "hopscotch" jumping game board, or a giant checker board. Use colored paper plates as the "checkers." Wet a piece of paper with water and then draw on it with chalk. What happens?







Mud Play Activities

Mud offers endless opportunities for constructive and fun family play. Playing with mud—a free, open-ended material—can offer a deeper, more creative play experience than many of the expensive, one-purpose toys you can buy. In addition, mud is almost universally available. Got dirt? Just add water!

What can you do with mud? Make mud handprints on heavy paper or on the sidewalk. Add glitter for "fancy mud" play. Set up a "mud kitchen" outdoors, complete with pots, pans, bowls, and spoons—a perfect place to make "mud pies!"



# Infants & Toddlers: The Power of Sensory Experiences

Exploring Through the Genses

**Touch. Touch is a powerful learning tool for enhancing a baby's early emotional learning.** A baby's skin is very sensitive; stroke it gently and tenderly. He will wriggle his whole body and thrust his legs out. He may smile and look relaxed. All of a baby's skin is sensitive to touch. Caress him with gentle, swooping palmar strokes from the top of his head and down his back and legs. His sensory system will get a special message as well as a massage! He will feel safe, whole, and lovable.

Some of a baby's earliest responses to touch are reflexive. If you stroke the sole of a newborn's foot, his toes flare out in a Babinski reflex. Later, in neurologically normal infants, the toes curl when the sole is stroked. If you stroke a tiny baby's mouth on one side, then he will turn toward that side in a rooting reflex.

Babies under one year respond to touch with an "all or nothing" response. If you tickle one foot gently, both the tickled foot and the other foot are likely to move. As babies develop, they gain more muscular control and begin to respond just to the touched foot or hand. Hearing. Babies are quite sensitive to sounds even before they are born. (After birth, babies prefer to hear a mother's voice reading a story she has read while the baby was still in the womb.) Babies are also sensitive to harsh sounds. Even babies in a newborn nursery begin to cry when they hear another baby crying. Loud or harsh adult talk worries a baby. Often infants and toddlers burst into tears if an adult's voice rises in anger, exasperation, or scolding. Babies love crooning, gentle voices. Most babies love it when an adult speaks in "Parentese"-drawing out vowels, raising the voice an octave, and speaking slowly in short phrases with loving tones. Cascades of chemicals and electrical impulses flow through the baby's brain when he hears "Parentese." This style of speaking with a baby wires words into the brain. Also wired in is the certainty of being loved and feeling like an especially important little person.

Taste/Smell/Texture. Tiny babies make upset faces when tasting bitter or sour substances. Most love sweet tastes. They have several hundred more taste buds for sweet in their mouths than adults do. Because it is naturally sweet, strained applesauce is a hit with babies as a first solid food, along with rice cereal, which is the least allergenic of early solid foods. Older babies often reject certain tastes and textures. They may not like the grainy texture of strained liver. When starting to feed an older baby solid foods, realize that the taste of a cold metal spoon may not be comfortable. At first, offer small tastes of new foods on a warm spoon.

It's helpful to combine sensory stimulation with opportunities for developing bodily skills. A mobile allows a baby to watch with great interest and to learn to kick so that the mobile keeps dancing in the air. A teacher of toddlers can put on dance music whose familiar words and rhythms the children already love and then encourage them to dance to the music as well as enjoy listening to it.

You are the gatekeeper for a young child's sensory stimulation. By offering sensory experiences in careful doses, accompanied by careful observations of babies responses, you will help them manage sensory input in order to experience pleasure and interest in new experiences. # **Social Distancing and Safety Guidelines**

## How to Protect Yourself and Others

#### Clean your hands often-



#### Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds especially after you have been in a public place, or after blowing your nose, coughing, or sneezing.


- If soap and water are not readily available, use a hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol.
- Cover all surfaces of your hands and rub them together until they feel dry.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands.

### Do Not Share Writing Utensils or Tools

- To minimize the spread of sickness, use your own pens and pencils or any supplies you may need to take notes and activities in your session.
- If you happen to use or touch other tools, we advise you wash your hands or apply hand sanitizer to keep yourself and others safe immediately.
- You are more than welcome to wear gloves to protect yourself.

### Cover your mouth and nose with a cloth face cover

#### - when around others



public, for example to the grocery store or to pick up other necessities.

- Cloth face coverings should not be placed on young children under age 2, anyone who has trouble breathing, or is unconscious, incapacitated or otherwise unable to remove the mask without assistance.
- The cloth face cover is meant to protect other people in case you are infected.
- Do NOT use a facemask meant for a healthcare worker.
- Continue to keep about 6 feet between yourself and others. The cloth face cover is not a substitute for social distancing.

### Maintain a Healthy Distance of 6 Feet



- Stand on the designated floor markers to help better engage in a healthy distance between yourself and others.


# Encouraging School Readiness from Birth to 3

You can help babies and toddlers learn and grow by getting to know each child in your care and engaging in activities that match their individual skills, needs, and interests.

Babies are born ready to learn. Adults often wonder how they can get their baby or toddler off to a good start so that he is ready for kindergarten. Remember, young children learn best through their everyday experiences with the people they love and trust, and when the learning is fun. Here are **four key skill areas** that help children get ready for school.

# Language & Literacy Skills

Learning to communicate, first through gestures and babbles and then through words, helps children connect to the people and world around them. The development of language skills is the foundation for becoming literate. Reading to children and letting them play with books helps to build their interest in books. Talking, reading aloud, and singing all nurture children's language skills and help them experience stories through listening.



# Self-Confidence

When children feel good about themselves and their abilities, they are more willing to take on new challenges—a key ingredient for school success. Self-confidence is important for getting along with others and developing relationships with peers, which are key factors in enjoying and succeeding in school.

# Thinking Skills

Children are born with a drive to understand how the world works. They start by figuring out connections such as: "I cry, Daddy comes to get me." As they grow, these connections become more complex, for example: "If the ball disappears under the couch, I can use this stick to get it back." Children learn about how the world works when they are given the chance to explore—to shake, toss, touch, listen, stack, knock down, bounce, and so on. When children are exploring and having fun, they are learning.

# Self-Control

The ability to express and manage emotions in appropriate ways is called "self-control." Self-control is also the ability to stop one's self from doing something that is not allowed. Very young children have little self-control. But you can help babies and toddlers work on skills like cooperating, coping with frustration, sharing, and resolving conflicts which all lead to the development of self-control.
