Fine Motor Development

Gross Motor Play: The Back Story

Writing is one of the most complex skills a human being performs with their hands. Developmental readiness for writing starts with gross motor movement and play - not worksheets and pencils. Gross motor activities include, but are not limited to: plenty of outdoor play, running, jumping, swinging, bike-riding, ball play, dancing and crawling.

Establishing Hand Dominance

Encourage children's use of hands in play and daily activities where two hands are performing different jobs in order to develop hand dominance. Presenting toys and one-handed activities or implements at the midline allows young children to use the preferred hand to grasp and use the object spontaneously, which reinforces hand dominance.

Crossing the Midline

Crossing the midline indicates that the two sides of the brain are working with each other. Children's hands and arms cross the body in gross motor functional movements, such as wiping off a table, sweeping the floor. Performance of these activities is one of the first steps toward crossing the midline accurately in fine motor tasks, such as forming shapes and symbols.

Developing the Tripod Pencil Grasp

Efficient tripod pencil grasp involves three fingers working together to hold the pencil. They are helping to stabilize the child's hand so that the Busy Fingers can effectively hold and move a pencil, crayon, or tool. Before holding a pencil, children should practice the tripod grasp when using tweezers, tongs, or squeezers to sort or stack manipulatives.

Positioned for Success: Strategies to Try

- Color code the thumbhole on scissors by wrapping it with tape in a contrasting color.
- Tape paper to edge of desk or middle of easel so student can cut upwardly and make 'fringe.'
- Have the child "hold" a small roll of paper towel or newspaper under the cutting arm to ensure that the arm stays in the correct position.
- "Tummy Time" positioning automatically sets children up with successgul positioning for using scissors.

Get a Grip On Fine Motor Development

Prior to grasping a pencil correctly and learning how to write efficiently, young children develop the skills needed for writing through engaging in a wide variety of hands-on play experiences with toys and tools and participating in activities of daily living, such as self-feeding, dressing, and performing hygiene tasks. As administrators, educators, and parents our role is to understand and facilitate appropriate fine motor development in order to support future writing performance of young children. Important prerequisites for writing include establishing hand dominance, the ability to cross the midline, and developing the tripod pencil grasp.

Incorporate Vertical Surfaces

Try This:

- Chalkboard
- Easel
- Walls

Try Activities traditionally done at a table on a vertical surface for a new and more appropriate, experience for example.

- Coloring
- Stamping
- Playdough

- Painting, etc...

Scissor Skill Development

Try This:

- Crumpling of paper is the first step toward cutting with scissors. When a child crumples paper they are establishing the needed motor planning for the "open-close" pattern required for using scissors.
- Ripping the ripping action facilitates the tripod grasp with hands ripping the paper in opposite directions.
- **Snipping** with scissors means that one cute does the job.
- Cutting on curves can start on round paper plates. cutting on angles and complex patterns is most challenging.

Appropriate fine motor skills development contributes to increased legibility of handwriting, rate of written production, test scores, and overall level of confidence at school. View more on this article about handwriting on communityplaythings.com

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Training Levels

Basic = Most appropriate for entry-level professionals who are new to early childhood and/or school-age care. Basic Level Training covers a foundational understanding and demonstration of developing skills.

Intermediate = Most appropriate for professionals who have at least (2) years of experience and 120 hours of training in child development, and are moving toward more formal education. Intermediate Level Training includes expanding knowledge and application, and refining skills.

Advanced = Most appropriate for professionals who have at least three (3) years of experience and 30 credit hours in child development. Advanced Level Training focuses on a more thorough knowledge and understanding of developmentally appropriate practice and highly effective application and demonstration of skills.



Using New Communication Tools to Develop Family Partnerships

Teachers know there are many benefits to family engagement—support for early learning tops the list! In the past, programs often created print-based newsletters and tip sheets to send home information. Now, educators have new technology-based options available that make it easier to not only inform families but also involve them more deeply in their children's education.

A variety of new communication systems use technology to streamline the processes of organizing and sending photos, videos, audio recordings, website links, and text (with translation, if needed) to a family's mobile device or computer. The posts are readily available electronically for families to review—and in many systems, family members can

For busy early childhood education teachers looking for new ways to partner with families, these communication systems offer many options. We tried out these new systems in order to explore how a technology-based approach could extend children's learning and deepen family engagement. Here, we share our favorite strategies:

"MEETING" CLASSROOM

VISITORS - Sharing special guests' class visits can help families guide children in making connections between school, home, and community. In one classroom, when children were studying pets, the teacher invited a veterinarian to visit. The teacher took and shared photos and video clips of the visit. She then sent home a photo of an X-ray, with a challenge to extend the experience and conversation: "Can you guess what this dog ate? Record your answers together!"

INVITING CLOSE

OBSERVATIONS - Learning to observe closely is an important scientific skill with implications for literacy and math learning. In addition to using handheld magnifying lenses, in one class the children took magnified photos of their snack items with a digital Proscope microscope, which also projected images to a tablet. The teacher sent home the images and challenged families: "Can you find the snack that belongs to your child?" Introducing families to new tools children are using in the classroom can support closer observation and inquiry at home.

ENCOURAGING FAMILY COLLABORATION - Posting

projects for families to view creates opportunities for children and their families to work and learn together. In the block area, children were excited to share photos of their buildings and stories. They wanted to continue to improve their constructions because they knew their families could view them. One family member looked at a block structure/story and used the comment feature, wondering how people could get into the building. This inspired design corrections and a new building direction.



HOME - Teachers can easily send digital messages to all parents or guardians in the group, such as alerts about upcoming school events or health issues and requests to bring things in. The posts are then available electronically for families to review as needed—no more digging through backpacks looking for handouts!





When you choose a communication system, it's important to identify access issues and look for solutions so all families can be involved. The preschool teachers in our group used the free digital portfolio system Seesaw, but there are many different family engagement systems available. They range in complexity, with a variety of features and prices. Asking families for feedback about their communication preferences to find out the kinds of information they would like to receive is a good place to start.
